Angel's Envy Distillery

Rooted in 200 years of bourbon heritage, Angel's Envy creates hand-finished spirits that aren't afraid to improve on the classic tradition. The 5% of spirit lost each year during barrel aging is called the "Angel's Share." After tasting our finished whiskey, Master Distiller Lincoln Henderson joked that we'd finally gotten a better deal than the angels. And so, Angel's Envy was born.

Conrad-Caldwell House Museum

The Conrad-Caldwell House Museum is one of the finest examples of Richardsonian Romanesque architecture. The Museum has been lovingly restored to the Edwardian Age, housing a massive collection of period items including many original pieces, and stands as a testament to the abundant lifestyle of the owners. Step back in time as you learn more about the era, the neighborhood, and the families who lived here.

Evan Williams Bourbon Experience

In 1783, Evan Williams opened Kentucky's first distillery on the banks of the Ohio River. Many years and barrels later, they still produce bourbon using the same time-honored methods.

Kentucky Derby Museum

The Kentucky Derby Museum is a nonprofit organization entrusted to preserve the history and legacy of the Kentucky Derby, the longest continuously running sporting event in the country dating back to 1875. The museum is located next to Churchill Downs[®] Racetrack just 10 minutes from downtown Louisville. General Admission tickets are available for purchase and include full access to the museum, including two floors of interactive exhibits, a viewing of "The Greatest Race" film, and a guided walking tour of Churchill Downs.

Kentucky Science Center

The Kentucky Science Center's flagship location on Louisville's historic "Museum Row," welcomes visitors with three floors of interactive exhibits and films on a 4-story screen. With daily programming for children, families, and adults, the Kentucky Science Center plays an ongoing role in the region as a resource for teachers, a gathering place for the science community, and a chosen source of entertainment for all.

Logan Street Market

Louisville's first public market, Logan Street Market, boasts 25,000 square feet filled with 25+ locally owned and operated food, beverage, provisions, and artisan shops. Events include live music, block parties, and workshops.

Louisville Slugger Museum & Factory

The Louisville Slugger Museum & Factory is located in Louisville's "Museum Row," part of the West Main District of downtown. The museum showcases the history of Louisville Slugger baseball bats from 1884 to today.

Louisville Zoological Gardens

Opened in 1969, the Louisville Zoo currently exhibits more than 1,100 animals on 130 acres of natural settings. The Zoo's award-winning Islands, Gorilla Forest, and Glacier Run exhibits have been recognized by the Association of Zoos and Aquariums (AZA) for their excellence and innovation.

Michter's Fort Nelson Distillery

Originally known as Shenk's and later as Bomberger's, Michter's was one of America's first whiskey companies, founded in Schaefferstown, Pennsylvania, in 1753. Stop in for a guided tour and tasting to learn about their "Cost Be Damned" approach to producing the highest quality American whiskeys and enjoy a drink at the world-class Bar at Fort Nelson.

Stitzel-Weller Distillery

Located only five miles from downtown Louisville, the Stitzel-Weller Distillery Experience is one of the most convenient and impressive stops along the Kentucky Bourbon Trail[®].
